RN Lena: Well, we need this bed for another patient. The other room is as comfortable and nice as this one. You are going to like it.

(Nurse Lena comes into the nursing station.)

RN Lena:

RN Allison: Dr. Cohen just ordered Mr. Watson to be put on contact isolation precautions so we need to change rooms for either him or his roommate. The patient is suspected of C. difficile infection.

RN Lena:

RN Allison: That's the problem. We don't have private rooms available at this time. You know we only have 4 private rooms, and two of them are occupied by neutropenic patients. A suspected TB patient is in the negative pressure room, and a patient with pelvic cancer is having radiation therapy in the other private room.

RN Lena:

RN Allison: It seems that we will have to put Mr. Watson's neighbor into another room, so Mr. Watson can be by himself. Actually, bed control told me that a new patient is to be transferred to our unit from the ER; he, too, has a C. difficile infection. That's Felicia's patient. I'll put the new admission in the same room with Mr. Watson.

RN Allison: Right. Let's go ahead and put Mr. Watson's roommate, Mr. Albert in Room 421. He is 92 years old and has invasive lines. He is a vulnerable patient and needs to be kept away from infectious agents. 421-1 is an empty bed; the patient in

Bed 2 is a young patient recovering from an appendectomy. I think the room is better for Mr. Albert.

RN Allison: Beat you to it! The secretary has already sent a message to environmental services.

(In the patient room. Mr. Albert is Mr. Watson's roommate patient.)

Mr. Albert: Hi, Lena. I am OK.
